- Whilst many of our events were postponed, a number of global webinars, free to watch live, provided CPD opportunities for our members and for nonmembers.

- May'20: A new COVID-19 Special Interest Group was established
- August'20: Position Stand on 'Reopening' of Higher Education institutions' Sport and Exercise Science Departments after Lockdown.

### **Notes to Financial Statements**

- BASES reported a surplus of £45,352 for the year ended 31 March 2020, driven by an increase in general income and a reduction in general expenditure over the previous year.
- The Board has considered contingencies and mitigating action in the event that income streams are impacted by COVID-19.
- BASES is a not-for-profit organisation; as such, it operates on the basis that it is not seeking to make a profit over the long-term and reserves should be re-invested to support the activities of the Association.
- Total reserves at 31 March 2020 were £338,803.

### Recap: 2015-2020 - Events



- Annual conferences at St George's Park, East Midlands Convention Centre (2), Harrogate International Convention Centre and King Power Stadium attracted 1,841 delegates, with 1,004 abstracts and 107 exhibitors
- Student conferences took place at Liverpool John Moores Univ, Bangor Uni, Uni of St Mark and St John, Northumbria Uni and Univ of Dundee & Abertay Uni, attracting 1,256 delegates
- 103 workshops were delivered, supporting 1,478 delegates
- 44 webinars were delivered, with 13,072 delegates registering
- CPD Endorsement scheme launched (16/17) 16 courses endorsed
- 315 attendees at the HoD events at Staffordshire Uni (4) and Coventry Uni

### Recap: 2015-2020 - Standards



- Over this period, there has been an average of 150 registered Supervisors and 117 registered Reviewers, supporting an average of 158 Supervised Experience candidates.
- Per year, over this period, there has been an average of 310 BASES Accredited members, 195 Chartered Scientist, 42 Certified Exercise Practitioners and 28 High Performance Sport Accredited members.
- Sport and Exercise Psychology Accreditation Route was approved by the Health and Care Professions Council in July'19; 48 candidates have enrolled in 2020
- An average of 19 laboratories per year were BASES accredited
- In 2017/18, a BUES Review Task Force was set up. Over the 2015-20 period, the number of BASES Undergraduate Endorsement Scheme courses has increased from 37 to 60

### Recap: 2015-2020 - Publications



- Four quality editions of The Sport and Exercise Scientist were published each year
- 17 Expert Statements (full open access) were produced, with over 16,000 views/downloads
- An average of 1641 papers each year were submitted to the Journal of Sports Sciences, with an average of 16% published
- Social Media followings have increased significantly over the period, up 86% across all platforms:
- ➤ Twitter from 20,193 to 30,702, Facebook from 3,331 to 5,560, LinkedIn from 1,712 to 5,874 and Instagram from 111 to 1,769
- The updated BASES Career Guide: A Guide to Careers in Sport and Exercise Science was launched in August'20
- Reciprocal agreement with the Association for Applied Sport Psychology was signed in 2020 to access to each organisation's publications


### Special resolution to update the Articles of Association



- Articles of Association set out the rules by which an organisation operates, including how its AGM's are held
- The current BASES Articles of Association are based on the articles that were compliant with Companies Acts 1985 and 1989. A key constraint with the current articles does allow for virtual AGMs to be held\*. Whereby the meaning of 'place' is read as a physical location and 'present' requires a physical presence in the meeting at the location.
- Since May 2020, work has taken place to review of our Articles in relation to basing them
  on the new articles (Companies Act 2006) to provide this flexibility in addition updating
  and adding new sections to reflect BASES as it is.
- Recommendation: to adopt the new Memorandum and Articles of Association (poll)
- If approved, the Special Resolution to adopt new Memorandum and Articles of Association will be completed and submitted to Companies House, with a copy of the new Memorandum and Articles of Association
